Mairangatia te Angitu was a two-day symposium for leaders of kaupapa Māori, Kāhui Ako ASLs, and the network of cultural leaders across Waitaha to celebrate Māori success as Māori. The symposium was co-designed by a working group including mana whenua representatives Lynne Te Aika and Liz Hill-Taiaroa along with Grow Waitaha team members Verity Tamepo, Janelle Riki-Waaka, Dr Chris Jansen and Dr Cheryl Doig.

Kōkirihia, wānanga rangatahi

Kōkirihia, the plan for removing streaming from our schools, was released in March 2023. Supported by Grow Waitaha, Tokona te Raki invited Māori and Pacific student leaders (age 16 years and over) to attend a series of wānanga designed to encourage a movement for positive change in our education system.

Our intentions for the wananga rangatahi

- + Whanaungatanga raise awareness through in-person connections, digital media, and community events.
- Wānanga build connections through wānanga to develop collective understanding about the impact of streaming and how ending streaming will lead to better outcomes for rangatahi.
- + Kotahitanga create a movement of rangatahi voice across the motu through connection and awareness.

What we did

- + A series of wānanga at the Tokona te Raki lab in 2023, facilitated by Kaya Renata-Staples from Tokona te Raki, and Carmen Aldridge.
- + A new series of wānanga to support rangatahi to maintain momentum for the kaupapa, facilitated by Kaya Renata-Staples at the Tokona te Raki lab in 2024.

Destreaming maths and literacy programmes in primary education

Our destreaming workshops for kaiako and leaders explored why destreaming through flexible grouping is a valuable and effective support for equity in all primary school classrooms.

Our intentions for the workshops

- + Share what flexible and mixed groupings look like and how they work.
- + Share research and practical ideas for providing ākonga with equitable and inclusive learning opportunities.

What we did

- A destreaming in primary education maths workshop at BrainTree Wellness Centre, facilitated by Amanda Campbell.
- A destreaming in primary education literacy workshop at BrainTree Wellness Centre, facilitated by Amanda Campbell.

Empowering gender-diverse rangatahi in education

School can be a difficult place for gender-diverse ākonga, such as those who identify as transgender. This initiative supports schools to become more inclusive of gender-diverse ākonga, whānau and kaiako.

Our intentions

- + Work alongside rangatahi to help the education sector to become a safe and empowering place for rangatahi with diverse gender identities.
- + Create a range of resources and wananga opportunities for boards, school tumuaki, senior leaders and kaiako.

What we did

+ Produced a video with an overview of the kaupapa and why we believe it is important for schools to engage with it.

- + Support teams of leaders to implement change projects.
- Support broader collaboration, including between schools who are doing similar mahi.

What we did

- + One-day hui at Te Ora Hou Ōtautahi (further hui planned later in 2024) facilitated by Wiremu Gray, Amira Aman, Dr Chris Jansen, and Greg Jansen.
- + Ongoing 1:1 mentoring with principals.
- + Reached 13 secondary schools and 70 leaders.

Our intentions

- + Embrace AI to support powerful learning.
- + Use AI tools to focus on learning processes rather than the product, for example, pedagogy, differentiation.
- + Shift thinking past the idea that AI is cheating.

What we did

- + Conducted two face-to-face workshops at Tātai Aho Rau Core Education facilitated by Nicki Tempero, Suzi Gould and Stephen McConnachie.
- + Conducted two webinars.
- + Reached 106 kaiako.

- + Reached 250 rangatahi and 33 schools across the rohe.

- + Held two one-day hui at The McFaddens Centre facilitated by Kerry Hall, Suzi Gould, and Greg Jansen.
- + Offered a series of workshops facilitated by Gretchen Smith, Tumuaki at Te Huarahi | Linwood Avenue School, Dr Gabrielle Wall and Rich Matla from Leadership Lab, and Suzi Gould.
- + Reached 57 wellbeing leaders.

What we did

+ Workshops facilitated by Daisy Lavea-Timo at Papanui High School, Christchurch Girls' High School | Te Kura o Hine Waiora, Ao Tawhiti, and Cashmere High School to scaffold learning for rangatahi and to 'teach the teacher.'

- + 50+ lead principals regularly attend a wide catchment.
